

CHAPTER – V

FOLLOW UP OF AUDIT OBSERVATIONS

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5.1 Non-submission of Action Taken Notes

With a view to ensure accountability of the Executive in respect of all the issues dealt with in various Audit Reports, the Public Accounts Committee (PAC) of Mizoram issued (May 2000) instructions for submission of *suo moto* Action Taken Notes (ATNs) on all paragraphs and reviews (Performance Audits) featured in the Audit Report within three months of its presentation to the Legislature. The PAC has provided six months' time for submission of the ATNs on its recommendations.

A review of follow-up action on the submission of ATNs disclosed that there was pendency in respect of the Audit Reports for the years 2015-16 to 2020-22. The Audit Report for the year 2022-23 was tabled in the State Legislature on 27 August 2025.

5.2 Response to audit observations and compliance thereof by the Executive

The Principal Accountant General (Audit) conducts periodical inspections of Government Departments to assess, on a test-check basis, whether proper financial records and accounting practices are being maintained according to established rules and procedures. These inspections result in the issuance of Inspection Reports (IRs), which are sent to the heads of the inspected offices and higher authorities. Government regulations mandate prompt action on IRs by the Executive, and the heads of offices and higher authorities are obligated to rectify any identified issues and report their compliance to the Principal Accountant General. The office of the Principal Accountant General also brings significant irregularities to the attention of the heads of departments.

5.2.1 Outstanding Inspection Reports and Paragraphs

Details of outstanding paragraphs pertaining to Social, General and Economic Sectors during the last five years are as shown in **Table-5.1**.

5.2.2 Revenue Sector

As of June 2024, there were 210 pending IRs (Inspection Reports) totalling 853 paragraphs with a money value of ₹ 366.07 crore pertaining to the Revenue Sector. The status of IRs for the past five years is outlined in **Table-5.2**.

The above **Table-5.3** shows that over the past five years, departments under the Revenue Sector have accepted 17 paragraphs with a money value of ₹ 15.76 crore, of which only ₹ 0.96 crore has been recovered as of 31 March 2024.

The Departments need to evolve a strong mechanism to monitor and ensure recovery of accepted cases.

5.3 Response of departments concerned to the draft audit paragraphs

The draft audit paragraphs proposed for inclusion in the Report of the Comptroller and Auditor General of India are forwarded by the Principal Accountant General to the Principal Secretaries/ Secretaries of the departments concerned, drawing their attention to audit findings with a request to send their response within four weeks. Non-receipt of replies from departments/ Government is invariably indicated at the end of such paragraphs included in the Audit Report.

10 Compliance Audit paragraphs proposed to be included in the Audit Report for the year ended 31 March 2024 were sent to Principal Secretaries/ Secretaries of the respective departments for their responses. Government response was received in respect of all the 10 draft paragraphs which have been incorporated at appropriate places.

5.4 Audit Committee Meetings

The State Government had constituted (04 September 2013) an Audit Committee to consider and take measures for timely response and speedy settlement of outstanding IRs/ paragraphs pending in various Departments.

However, no meetings of the Audit Committee took place during the year 2023-24.

The Government may ensure that Audit Committee convenes regularly to review, discuss, settle and take action on audit observations.
