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## Report of the Comptroller and Auditor General of India

### Audit of the Finance Accounts of the Government of Harvana

#### **Opinion**

The Finance Accounts of the Government of Haryana for the year ended 31 March 2023, present the financial position along with accounts of the receipts and disbursements of the Government for the year involving transactions from and/or to the Consolidated Fund, the Contingency Fund and the Public Account of the State. The compilation of Finance Accounts comprises two Volumes; Volume- I contains the consolidated position of the state of finances and explanatory 'Notes to Finance Accounts' including a summary of Significant Accounting Policies and Volume - II depicts the accounts in detail. The Appropriation Accounts of the Government for the year for Grants and Charged Appropriations, which represent the budget comparison, are presented separately.

On the basis of the information and explanations that my officers required and have obtained and as a result of test audit of the accounts, in my opinion, the Finance Accounts read with the explanatory 'Notes to Finance Accounts' present fairly the financial position and the receipts and disbursements of the Government of Haryana for the year 2022-23.

Observations arising from audit of these accounts as well as audit conducted during the year or earlier years are contained in my Financial, Compliance and Performance Audit Reports on the Government of Haryana being presented separately for the year ended 31 March 2023.

## **Basis for Opinion**

The conduct of audit is in accordance with the CAG's Auditing Standards. These Standards require that we plan and perform audits to obtain reasonable assurance that the accounts are free from material misstatement. An audit includes examination, on a test basis, of evidence relevant to the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The audit evidence that we have obtained provides a basis for my opinion.

## Responsibilities for Preparation of the Initial and Subsidiary Accounts

The State Government is responsible for obtaining authorisation of budget from the State Legislature. The State Government and those responsible for execution of budget such as treasuries, offices and departments of the Government of Haryana are responsible for preparation and correctness of the initial and subsidiary accounts as well as for ensuring the regularity of transactions in accordance with the applicable laws, standards, rules and regulations.

Also, they are responsible for rendering the initial and subsidiary accounts and information related thereto to the Office of the Principal Accountant General (Accounts and Entitlements) of Haryana for compilation and preparation of the Finance Accounts.

## **Responsibilities for Compilation of Annual Accounts**

The Office of the Principal Accountant General (Accounts and Entitlements) of Haryana functioning under my control is responsible for compilation and preparation of Annual Accounts of the State Government. This is in accordance with the requirements of the Comptroller and Auditor General's (Duties, Powers and Conditions of Service) Act, 1971.

The Annual Accounts have been compiled from the vouchers, challans and initial and subsidiary accounts as received from the treasuries, offices and departments of the Government of Haryana and the statements received from the Reserve Bank of India.

Statements (8, 9, 19 & 20) and Appendices (IV, VI, VIII, IX, X, XI, XII & XIII) in this compilation have been prepared directly from the information received from the Government of Haryana and the Union Government who are responsible for such information.

#### Responsibilities for the Audit of the Annual Accounts

The audit of the Annual Accounts is conducted through the Office of the Principal Accountant General (Audit) in accordance with the requirements of Articles 149 and 151 of the Constitution of India and the Comptroller and Auditor General's (Duties, Powers and Conditions of Service) Act, 1971 for expressing an opinion on these Accounts based on the results of such audit.

The Office of the Principal Accountant General (Audit) and the Office of the Principal Accountant General (Accounts and Entitlements) are independent organisations with distinct cadres, separate reporting lines and management structure.

## **GUIDE TO THE FINANCE ACCOUNTS**

## A. Broad Overview of the Structure of Government Accounts

- 1. The Finance Accounts of the State of Haryana present the accounts of receipts and outgoings of the Government for the year, together with the financial results disclosed by the Revenue and Capital accounts, the accounts of the Public Debt and the liabilities and assets of the State Government as worked out from the balances recorded in the accounts. The Finance Accounts are accompanied by Appropriation Accounts, which present comparison of expenditure against the Grants/Appropriations.
- **2.** The Accounts of the Government are kept in the following three parts:

Part I: Consolidated Fund: This Fund comprises all revenues received by the State Government, all loans raised by the State Government (market loans, bonds, loans from the Central Government, loans from Financial Institutions, Special Securities issued to National Small Savings Fund, etc.), Ways and Means Advances (WMA) extended by the Reserve Bank of India (RBI) and all moneys received by the State Government in repayment of loans. No moneys can be appropriated from this Fund, except in accordance with law and for the purposes and in the manner provided by the Constitution of India. Certain categories of expenditure (e.g., salaries of Constitutional authorities, loan repayments, etc.), constitute a charge on the Consolidated Fund of the State (Charged Expenditure) and are not subject to vote by the Legislature. All other expenditure (Voted Expenditure) is voted by the Legislature.

The Consolidated Fund comprises two sections: Revenue and Capital (including Public Debt, Loans and Advances). These are further categorised under 'Receipts' and 'Expenditure'. The Revenue Receipts section is divided into three sectors, *viz.*, 'Tax Revenue', 'Non Tax Revenue' and 'Grants-in-aid and Contributions'. These three sectors are further divided into sub-sectors like 'Goods and Services Tax', 'Taxes on Income and Expenditure', 'Fiscal Services', *etc.* The Capital Receipts section does not contain any sectors or sub-sectors. The Revenue Expenditure section is divided into four sectors, *viz.*, 'General Services', 'Social Services', 'Economic Services' and 'Grants-in-aid and Contributions'. These sectors in the Revenue Expenditure section are further divided into sub-sectors, like, 'Organs of State', 'Education, Sports, Art and Culture', *etc.* The Capital Expenditure section is sub-divided into seven sectors, *viz.*, 'General Services', 'Social Services', 'Economic Services', 'Public Debt', 'Loans and Advances', 'Inter-State Settlement' and 'Transfer to Contingency Fund'.

Part II: Contingency Fund: This Fund is in the nature of an imprest, which is established by the State Legislature by law, and is placed at the disposal of the Governor to enable advances to be made for meeting unforeseen expenditure pending authorisation of such expenditure by the State Legislature. The fund is recouped by debiting the expenditure to the concerned functional major head relating to the Consolidated Fund of the State. The Contingency Fund of the Government of Haryana for 2022-23 is ₹ 1,000.00 crore.

Part III: Public Account: All other public moneys received by or on behalf of the Government, where the Government acts as a banker or trustee, are credited to the Public Account. The Public Account includes repayable such as Small Savings and Provident Funds, Deposits (bearing interest and not bearing interest), Advances, Reserve Funds (bearing interest and not bearing interest), Remittances and Suspense heads (both of which are transitory heads, pending final booking). The net cash balance available with the Government is also included under the Public Account. The Public Account comprises six sectors, *viz.*, 'Small Savings, Provident Funds, *etc.*' 'Reserve Funds', 'Deposit and Advances', 'Suspense and Miscellaneous', 'Remittances' and 'Cash Balance'. These sectors are further sub-divided into subsectors. The Public Account is not subject to the vote of the Legislature.

- **3.** Government accounts are presented under a six tier classification, *viz.*, Major Heads (four digits), Sub-Major Heads (two digits), Minor Heads (three digits), Sub-Heads (two digits), Detailed Heads (two to three digits) and Object Heads (two/three/four digits). Major Heads represent functions of Government, Sub-Major Heads represent sub-functions, Minor Heads represent programmes/activities, Sub-Heads represent schemes, Detailed Heads represent sub-schemes and Object Heads represent purpose/object of expenditure.
- **4.** The main unit of classification in accounts is the Major Head which contains the following coding pattern (according to the List of Major and Minor Heads corrected up to 31 March 2023).

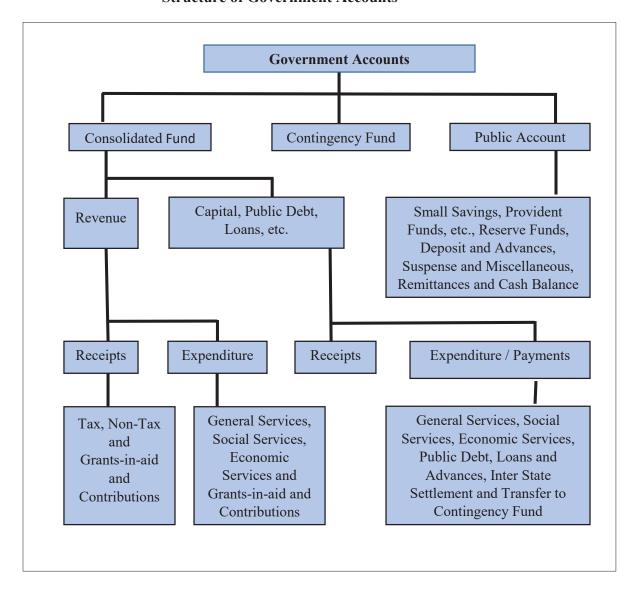

#### B. What the Finance Accounts contain

The Finance Accounts are presented in two volumes.

**Volume I** contains the Certificate of the Comptroller and Auditor General of India, the Guide to the Finance Accounts, 13 Statements which give summarised information on the financial position and transactions of the State Government for the current financial year and Notes to Finance Accounts. Description of 13 Statements and Notes to Finance Accounts in **Volume I** are given below:

1. Statement of Financial Position: This statement depicts the cumulative figures of assets and liabilities of the State Government, as they stand at the end of the year, and as compared to the position at the end of the previous year.

- 2. Statement of Receipts and Disbursements: This statement depicts all receipts and disbursements of the State Government during the year in all the three parts in which Government accounts are kept, *viz.*, the Consolidated Fund, Contingency Fund and Public Account. In addition, it contains an annexure, showing alternative depiction of Cash Balances (including investments) of the Government. The Annexure also depicts the Ways and Means position of the Government in detail.
- 3. Statement of Receipts (Consolidated Fund): This statement comprises Revenue and Capital Receipts, Borrowings and Repayments of the Loans given by the State Government. This statement corresponds to Detailed Statements 14, 17 and 18 in Volume II of the Finance Accounts.
- **4. Statement of Expenditure (Consolidated Fund)**: In departure from the general depiction of the Finance Accounts up to the Minor Head level, this statement gives details of expenditure by nature of activity (objects of expenditure) also. This statement corresponds to Detailed Statements 15, 16, 17 and 18 in Volume II.
- **5. Statement of Progressive Capital Expenditure**: This statement corresponds to the Detailed Statement 16 in Volume II.
- **6. Statement of Borrowings and Other Liabilities:** Borrowings of the Government comprise Market Loans raised by it (Internal Debt) and Loans and Advances received from the Government of India. 'Other Liabilities' comprise 'Small Savings, Provident Funds, *etc.*', 'Reserve Funds' and 'Deposits'. The statement also contains a note on service of debt and corresponds to the Detailed Statement 17 in Volume II.
- 7. Statement of Loans and Advances given by the Government: This statement depicts all Loans and Advances given by the State Government to various categories of loanees like Statutory Corporations, Government Companies, Autonomous and Other Bodies / Authorities and recipient individuals (including Government servants). This statement corresponds to the Detailed Statement 18 in Volume II.
- **8. Statement of Investments of the Government**: This statement depicts investments of the State Government in the equity capital of Statutory Corporations, Government Companies, other Joint Stock Companies, Co-operative institutions and Local Bodies. This statement corresponds to Detailed Statement 19 in Volume II.
- **9. Statement of Guarantees given by the Government**: This statement summarises theguarantees given by the State Government on repayment of principal and interest on loans raised by Statutory Corporations, Government Companies, Local Bodies and Other institutions. This statement corresponds to Detailed Statement 20 in Volume II.
- 10. Statement of Grants-in-aid given by the Government: This statement depicts all Grants-in-aid given by the State Government to various categories of grantees, like, Statutory Corporations, Government Companies, Autonomous and Other Bodies/Authorities and individuals. Appendix III provides details of the recipient institutions.

- 11. Statement of Voted and Charged Expenditure: This statement assists in the agreement of the net figures appearing in the Finance Accounts with the gross figures appearing in the Appropriation Accounts.
- 12. Statement of Sources and Application of Funds for Expenditure other than on Revenue Account: This statement is based on the principle that Revenue expenditure is expected to be defrayed from Revenue Receipts, while Capital Expenditure of the year is met from Revenue Surplus, net credit balances in the Public Account, Cash Balance at the beginning of the year, and Borrowings.
- 13. Summary of Balances under Consolidated Fund, Contingency Fund and Public Account: This statement assists in establishing the accuracy of the accounts. This statement corresponds to the Detailed Statements 14, 15, 16, 17, 18 and 21 in Volume II.

## **Notes to Finance Accounts and Significant Accounting Policies**

Notes to Finance Accounts provide disclosures and explanatory notes, which are intended to provide additional information / explanation relevant to the transactions, classes of transactions, balances, *etc.*, which shall be helpful to the stakeholders / users of the Finance Accounts.

Significant Accounting Policies, including basis of budget and financial reporting, requirements of Indian Government Accounting Standards (IGASs), form of accounts, classification between Capital and Revenue Expenditure, rounding off, periodical adjustments, *etc.*, are included as part of the Notes to Finance Accounts in Volume I of the Finance Accounts.

Volume II of the Finance Accounts contains two parts - 9 Detailed Statements in Part I and 13 Appendices in Part II.

## Part I of Volume II

- 14. Detailed Statement of Revenue and Capital Receipts by Minor Heads: This statement corresponds to the Summary Statement 3 in Volume I of the Finance Accounts. In addition to representing details of Revenue Receipts at Minor Head level, this statement depicts details at Sub Head level in respect of Grants-in-aid from Central Government.
- **15. Detailed Statement of Revenue Expenditure by Minor Heads**: This statement, which corresponds to the Summary Statement 4 in Volume I, depicts the Revenue Expenditure of the State Government. Charged and Voted expenditure are exhibited distinctly.

- 16. Detailed Statement of Capital Expenditure by Minor Heads and Sub Heads: This statement, which corresponds to the Summary Statement 5 in Volume I, depicts the Capital Expenditure (during the year and cumulatively) of the State Government. Charged and Voted expenditure are exhibited distinctly. In addition to representing details of Capital Expenditure at Minor Head level, in respect of significant schemes, this statement depicts details at Sub Head level also.
- 17. Detailed Statement of Borrowings and Other Liabilities: This statement, which corresponds to the Summary Statement 6 in Volume I, contains details of all loans raised by the State Government (market loans, bonds, loans from the Central Government, loans from Financial Institutions, Special Securities issued to National Small Savings Fund, etc.), and Ways and Means advances extended by the Reserve Bank of India. This statement presents the information on loans under three categories: (a) details of individual loans; (b) maturity profile, i.e., amounts payable in respect of each category of loans in different years; (c) interest rate profile of outstanding loans and annexure depicting Market Loans.
- **18. Detailed Statement of Loans and Advances given by the Government**: This statement corresponds to the Summary Statement 7 of Volume I.
- 19. Detailed Statement of Investments of the Government: This statement depicts details of investments entity wise and Major and Minor Head wise details of Investments during the year, where there is a difference between Statement 16 and 19. This statement corresponds to Statement 8 in Volume I.
- 20. Detailed Statement of Guarantees given by the Government: This statement depicts entity wise details of Government Guarantees. This statement corresponds to Statement 9 in Volume I.
- 21. Detailed Statement of Contingency Fund and Public Account Transactions: This statement depicts at Minor Head level the details of un-recouped amounts under Contingency Fund, consolidated position of Public Accounts transactions during the year, and outstanding balances at the end of the year.
- **22. Detailed Statement of Investments of Earmarked Balances**: This statement depicts details of Investment from the Reserve Funds and Deposits (Public Account).

#### Part II of Volume II

**Part II contains 13 Appendices** on various items including Salaries, Subsidies, Grants-in-aid, Externally Aided Projects, *etc*. These details are presented in the accounts at Sub-Head level or below (*i.e.*, below Minor Head levels) and so are not generally depicted in the Finance Accounts. A detailed list of appendices appears at the 'Table of Contents' in Volume I and II. The statements and Notes to Finance Accounts read with the appendices present the financial position along with accounts of the receipts and disbursements of the Government for the year.

## Cash Balances and Investments of Cash Balances Explanatory Notes

- (a) Cash and Cash Equivalents: Cash and cash equivalents consist of cash in treasuries and deposit with Reserve Bank of India and other Banks and Remittances in Transit, as stated in the pre-page statement. The balance under the head 'Deposits with Reserve Bank' depicts the combined balance of the Consolidated Fund, Contingency Fund and the Public Account at the end of the year. To arrive at the overall cash position, the cash balances with treasuries, departments and investments out of the cash balances/reserve funds etc. are added to the balance in 'Deposits with Reserve Bank of India'.
- **(b) Daily Cash Balance:** Under an agreement with the Reserve Bank of India, the State Government has to maintain a minimum cash balance of ₹ 1.14 crore with the Bank. If the balance falls below the agreed minimum on any day, the deficiency is made good by taking ordinary and special ways and means advances/overdrafts from time to time.

For arriving at the daily cash balance<sup>[2]</sup> for the purpose of grant of Ways and Means advances/Overdraft, the RBI evaluates the holdings of the 14 day treasury bills along with the transactions reported (at RBI counters, Inter-Government transactions and Treasury transactions reported by the agency banks) for the day. To the cash balance so arrived, the maturity of 14 day Treasury Bills if any, is added and excess balance, if any, after maintaining the minimum cash balance is reinvested in Treasury Bills. If the net cash balance arrived at results in less than the minimum cash balance or a credit balance and if there are no 14 day treasury bills maturing on that day, RBI rediscounts the holdings of the 14 day Treasury Bills and makes good the shortfall. If there is no holding of 14 day Treasury Bills on that day the State Government applies for Ways and Means Advances/Special Ways and Means Advances/Over Draft.

(c) The limit for ordinary ways and means advances to the State Government was ₹ 1,464.00 crore during 1 April 2022 to 31 March 2023. The Bank has also agreed to give special ways and means advances against the pledge of Government Securities. The limit of special ways and means advances is revised by the Bank from time to time.

The extent to which the Government maintained the minimum cash balance with the Reserve Bank during 2022-23 is given below:-

- (i) Number of days on which the minimum balance was maintained without taking any advance
  (ii) Number of days on which the minimum balance was maintained by taking ordinary ways and means advance
  (iii) Number of days on which the minimum balance was maintained by taking special ways and means advance
  (iv) Number of days on which there was shortfall in minimum balance even after taking the above advances, but no overdraft was taken
- (v) Number of days on which overdraft was taken. 4

At the close of the year 2022-23, no amount was outstanding under ways and means advances and overdraft. During 2022-23, an amount of ₹ 21,134.24 crore on account of ordinary ways and means advance/special ways and mean advance/overdraft was taken and the entire amount was repaid during the year thereby leaving nil balance.

During 2022-23, a sum of ₹ 10.36 crore was paid as interest on ways and means advance.

The State Government has invested ₹ 1,310.12 crore in the Government of India Securities under Cash Balance Investment Account. Interest realised during the year on these investments was ₹ 4.36 crore which was ₹ 21.09 crore less than that realised during last year.

The amounts invested out of earmarked funds are shown in Statement No. 22.

## **EXPLANATORY NOTES**

1. The significance of the head "Government Account" is explained below :-

# 13. SUMMARY OF BALANCES UNDER CONSOLIDATED FUND, CONTINGENCY FUND AND PUBLIC ACCOUNT-concid.

- Government has liability to repay the moneys received or has a claim to recover the amounts paid and also heads of account opened in the books for 2. The Other headings in this summary take into account the balances under all account heads in the Government books for which the adjustment of remittance transactions. It must be understood that these balances cannot be regarded as a complete record of the financial position of the Government of Haryana as these do not take into account all the physical assets of the State, such as Lands, Buildings, Communications, etc. nor any accrued dues or outstanding liabilities which are not brought to account under the cash basis of accounting followed by the Government.
- 3. A summary of receipts, disbursements and balances under heads of account relating to, Contingency Fund and Public Account is given in Statement No. 21. In a number of cases there are un-reconciled differences in the closing balances as reported in Statement No. 21 and those shown in the separate registers or other records maintained in the Accounts Office/Departmental offices for the purpose. Steps are being taken for collection of required details and documents to settle the discrepancies as soon as possible.
- 4. The balances are communicated to the concerned officers every year for acceptance thereof. In a number of cases such acceptances have not been received. In many cases, the delay extends over several years. Some instances where verification and acceptance of balances involving large amounts have been delayed are given in Appendix-VII.

### Notes to Finance Accounts for the year 2022-23

### 1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies:

### (i) Reporting Entity:

These accounts present the transactions of the Government of Haryana. The accounts of receipts and expenditure of the Government of Haryana have been compiled based on the initial accounts rendered by 24 Treasuries, 117 Public Works Divisions (59 Building and Roads, 58 Public Health Engineering), 40 Forest Divisions, 86 Irrigation/Water Resources Divisions, 38 Pay and Accounts Offices and Advices of the Reserve Bank of India. No account has been excluded at the end of the year.

### (ii) Reporting Period:

The reporting period of these accounts is 1 April 2022 to 31 March 2023.

### (iii) Reporting Currency:

The accounts of the Government of Haryana are reported in Indian Rupees (₹).

### (iv) Form of Accounts:

Under Article 150 of the Constitution of India, the accounts of the Union and of the States are kept in such form as the President may, on the advice of the Comptroller and Auditor General of India, prescribe. The word "form" used in Article 150 has a comprehensive meaning so as to include the prescription not only of the broad form in which the accounts are to be kept but also the basis for selecting appropriate heads of accounts under which the transactions are to be classified, which forms the chart of accounts.

### (v) Basis of Budget and Financial Reporting:

As per the provisions of Article 202 of the Constitution of India, a statement of estimated receipts and expenditure, the Annual Financial Statements (called Budget) for a financial year is presented to the legislature in the form of grants/appropriations before the commencement of the financial year. Budget is presented on gross basis without the recoveries and receipts which are otherwise permitted to be set off in reduction of expenditure. All grants/appropriations relating to heads of budget and accounts, whose balances are not carried forward, lapse at the end of the financial year.

**Budget and Accounts:** Both budget and accounts of the State follow the same accounting period, cash basis of accounting and uniform basis of classification. The accounts are classified as per the List of Major and Minor Heads to the level of Minor Heads as notified by the Controller General of Accounts in consultation with the Comptroller and Auditor General of India. Classification followed below Minor Heads is as agreed to by the Office of the Principal Accountant General (Accounts and Entitlements) in each state.

A separate budget comparison statement is presented as Appropriation Accounts, which represent actual disbursements in comparison to the grants/appropriations.

Cash basis: The accounts represent the actual cash receipts and disbursements during the reporting period with the exception of such book adjustments which are authorised. Receipts and disbursements in the Finance Accounts are on net basis; net of recoveries, deductions and refunds.

**Book Adjustments:** Book adjustments are non-cash transactions that appear in the accounts as adjustments/settlements. Some of these transactions take place at the level of the account rendering units, *e.g.*, treasuries, divisions, *etc.*, for adjustments of deductions and recoveries from salaries to Revenue Receipts/Loans/Public Account, 'nil' bills for transfer of moneys between the Consolidated Fund and Public Account, *etc.* 

Book adjustments are also carried out at Office of the Principal Accountant General (Accounts and Entitlements). These, amongst others, include booking for creation of and contribution to funds in Public Account (e.g., State Disaster Response Fund, Central Road and Infrastructure Fund, Sinking Fund, etc.) by debit to Consolidated Fund and crediting deposit heads of accounts in Public Account; annual adjustment of interest on General Provident Fund and State Government Group Insurance Scheme by debiting Major Head 2049-Interest Payments and crediting relevant Major Heads in Public Account; adjusting Debt waiver under the scheme of Government of India based on the recommendations of the Central Finance Commissions, recoupment of Contingency Fund, etc.

Classification between Capital and Revenue Expenditure: Significant expenditure incurred with the object of acquiring tangible assets of a permanent nature (for use in the organisation and not for sale in the ordinary course of business) or enhancing the utility of existing assets, are broadly defined as Capital expenditure. Subsequent charges on maintenance, repair, upkeep and working expenses, which are required to maintain the assets in a running order as also all other expenses incurred for the day to day running of

the organisation, including establishment and administrative expenses are classified as Revenue expenditure. Capital and Revenue expenditure are shown separately in the Accounts.

**Physical and Financial Assets and Liabilities:** Physical Assets and Financial Assets (such as, investments, loans and advances made by the Government, *etc.*), as well as Liabilities, such as, debt, *etc.*, are measured at historical cost. Physical Assets are not depreciated, and financial assets are not amortized. Losses in Physical Assets at the end of their life are also not expensed or recognised.

Grants-in-aid: In compliance with the Indian Government Accounting Standard (IGAS) 2: Accounting and Classification of Grants-in-aid, grants-in-aid in cash is recognised as revenue expenditure at the time of disbursement even if it involves creation of assets by the grantee, except in cases specifically authorised by the President on the advice of the Comptroller and Auditor General of India. All grants received are recognised as revenue receipts. Details for meeting the requirements of accounting and classification of Grants-in-aid given by the State Government are depicted in Statement 10 and Appendix III of the Finance Accounts. Detailed information in respect of Grants-in-aid given in kind is also depicted in Statement 10.

**Loans and advances:** In compliance with the IGAS 3: Loans and Advances made by Government, details of loans and advances made by the State Government are disclosed in Statements 7 and 18 of the Finance Accounts. The closing balances depicted in Statements as on 31 March 2023 are yet to be reconciled by the State Government. Various provisions of IGAS-3 are not fully complied with, for example information regarding repayment in arrear of loanee entities is not being provided.

**Retirement benefits:** Retirement benefits disbursed during the reporting period have been reflected in the accounts, but the future pension liability of the Government towards employees under the Old Pension scheme, *i.e.*, the liability towards payment of retirement benefits for the past and the present service of its employees is not included in the accounts.

### (vi) Rounding off:

These accounts present figures which are rounded-off to ₹ in Lakh and ₹ in Crore as depicted at the top of the respective Statements.

Minor difference of ₹ 0.01/0.02 lakh/crore, wherever occurring, between the Summary Statements and Detailed Statements in Volume-I and Volume-II respectively, is due to rounding off the figures.

### (vii) Cash Balance:

Cash balance as reported in the accounts of the State is the balance at end of the 31 March of a year as recorded in the Accounts of the State Government with the Central Accounts Section of the Reserve Bank of India. The cash balance reflects the balance after cash transactions involving Consolidated Fund, Contingency Fund and Public Account of the State for the year. Book adjustments do not affect the cash balance. Cash balance reported in the Finance Accounts is subject to reconciliation with the Reserve Bank of India.

### (viii) Disclosure of Contingent & Committed liabilities:

Contingent liabilities are not recognised. In compliance with the IGAS 1: 'Guarantees given by the Governments', Sector/Class—wise details of guarantees are disclosed in Statements 9 and 20 of the Finance Accounts as per the details made available by the State Government. The provisions of IGAS-1 are not fully complied with, as no information regarding automatic debit mechanism and structured payment arrangements has been provided. The matter regarding tracking unit for Guarantees is also still under consideration of the State Government.

The Government does not follow commitment accounting and the commitments are neither recorded nor are the liabilities against commitments recognised in accounts, but it discloses its future commitments under Appendix XII of the Finance Accounts.

### (ix) Pass-through transactions:

Pass-through transactions in the nature of receipts collected by the State but required to be transferred to other entity are disclosed in the Notes to Finance Accounts. These include transfer of 10 *per cent* of the collection of the year in the State CAMPA Fund to the National Fund on annual basis.

### 2. Compliance with the Accounting Framework:

### (i) Non-freezing of accounts by treasuries after closing monthly accounts:

Non-freezing of accounts by treasuries after closing monthly accounts may give scope for data manipulation after submission of monthly accounts to Principal Accountant General office and may lead to mismatch of figures/data between Principal Accountant General office and the State Government. However, the State Government has submitted that the accounts are not frozen so that Treasury Officers can change the head of account on the request of DDO.

### (ii) Opening of New Sub Heads/Detailed Heads of Accounts without advice:

According to Article 150 of the Constitution of India, the accounts of the State are to be kept in the form as advised by the Comptroller and Auditor General of India. During 2022-23, the State Government of Haryana opened 03 new Sub Heads (under Capital section) in the budget, without seeking the advice of the Comptroller and Auditor General as required under the Constitution. The State Government provided budget provisions under these heads and incurred expenditure of ₹ 519.33 crore under the Capital Section in these heads during 2022-23.

### 3. Consolidated Fund:

### (i) Goods and Services Tax:

Goods and Services Tax (GST) was introduced with effect from 1 July 2017. During the year 2022-23, the State GST collection was ₹ 28,576.56 crore compared to ₹ 22,922.15 crore in 2021-22, registering an increase of ₹ 5,654.41 crore (24.67 *per cent*). This includes Advance Apportionment of IGST amounting to ₹ (-) 47.40 crore. In addition, the State received ₹ 2,932.91 crore as its share of net proceeds assigned to the State under Central Goods and Services Tax. The total receipts under GST were ₹ 31,509.47 crore. The State received compensation of ₹ 2,575.89 crore as Revenue receipt on account of loss of revenue arising out of implementation of GST during 2022-23.

During the year 2022-23, adjustment entries for ₹ 376.70 crore of State GST (SGST) relating to the previous years 2017-18 and 2021-22 were carried out by the State Government due to difference between the RBI's figures and figures booked in the Finance Accounts. Hence, increase in SGST of ₹ 376.70 crore in 2022-23 is due to the adjustment.

The relevant figures are available in Statement No. 14 of the Finance Accounts.

### (ii) Reconciliation of Receipts and Expenditure between CCOs and Accountant General (A&E):

All Controlling Officers are required to reconcile receipts and expenditure of the Government with the figures accounted for by the Principal Accountant General (Accounts & Entitlements), Haryana. During the year 2022-23, receipts amounting to ₹ 89,268.60 crore (100 *per cent* of total Revenue and Capital receipts) and expenditure amounting to ₹ 1,18,071.17 crore (100 *per cent* of total Revenue and Capital expenditure) were reconciled by the State Government.

Receipts amounting to ₹ 78,158.85 crore (100 *per cent* of total Revenue and Capital receipts) and expenditure amounting to ₹ 1,09,470.60 crore (100 *per cent* of total Revenue and Capital expenditure) were reconciled by the State Government during 2021-22, *i.e.*, the previous year.

### (iii) Bookings under Minor Head 800-Other Expenditure and 800-Other Receipts:

The Minor Head 800-Other Expenditure/800-Other Receipts is to be operated only when the appropriate minor head has not been provided in the accounts. Routine operation of Minor Head 800 should be discouraged since it renders the accounts opaque.

During the year 2022-23, ₹ 9,488.99 crore under 33 Major Heads of accounts, constituting 8.04 *per cent* of the total Revenue and Capital expenditure (₹ 1,18,071.17 crore) was classified under the Minor Head 800-Other Expenditure in the accounts. During the previous year 2021-22, ₹ 9,226.56 crore under 33 Major Heads of accounts, constituting 8.43 *per cent* of the total Revenue and Capital expenditure (₹ 1,09,470.60 crore) was classified under the Minor Head 800-Other Expenditure in the accounts.

Similarly, ₹ 3,811.78 crore under 52 Major Heads of Account, constituting 4.27 per cent of the total Revenue and Capital Receipts (₹ 89,268.60 crore) was classified under 800-Other Receipts in the accounts. During the previous year, ₹ 2,812.55 crore under 53 Major Heads of Account, constituting 3.60 per cent of the total Revenue and Capital Receipts (₹ 78,158.85 crore) was classified under 800-Other Receipts in the accounts.

This has reference to Statements 14, 15 and 16 of the Finance Accounts.

## (iv) Transfer of funds to Personal Deposit (PD) Accounts:

The PD accounts enable designated Drawing Officers to incur expenditure for specific purposes pertaining to a scheme.

During 2022-23, an amount of ₹ 2,283.71 crore was transferred to these PD Accounts from sources other than the Consolidated Fund of the State. This includes ₹ 111.24 crore transferred in March 2023, of which, ₹ 0.13 crore was transferred on the last working day of March 2023.

In terms of Punjab Financial Rules Volume-I (as applicable to Haryana State), no Administrators of Personal Deposit Account (out of 153) had reconciled and verified their balances with the treasury figures and no annual verification certificates were furnished by them to the Treasury officer for onward submission to Principal Accountant General office.

# (v) Unadjusted Abstract Contingent (AC) Bills:

Financial Rules [Rule 2.10 (b)(5) of Punjab Financial Rules Volume I (as applicable to Haryana State)] envisage that no moneys should be drawn from Government treasury unless it is required for immediate disbursement. In emergent circumstances, Drawing and Disbursing Officers (DDOs) are authorised to draw sums of money through Abstract Contingent (AC) bills. In terms of the Punjab Treasury Rules (as applicable to Haryana State), DDOs are required to present Detailed Countersigned Contingent (DCC) bills containing vouchers in support of final expenditure within one month from the date of completion of the purpose for which the advance was drawn.

Out of 2,867 AC bills amounting to ₹ 777.44 crore drawn during the year 2022-23, 267 AC bills amounting to ₹ 132.48 crore (17.04 *per cent*) were drawn in March 2023. DCC Bills in respect of a total of 715 AC bills amounting to ₹ 305.73 crore as on 31 March 2023 were due but not received.

#### (vi) Utilisation Certificates (UCs) for Grants-in-Aid not received:

In terms of Rule 8.14 of the Punjab Financial Rules Volume-I (as applicable to Haryana State), Utilisation Certificates (UCs) in respect of Grants-in-Aid received by the grantee

should be furnished by the grantee to the authority that sanctioned it, within 12 months of closure of the financial year of sanction of grant. To the extent of non-submission of UCs, there is a risk that the amount shown in Finance Accounts may not have been utilised.

During the year 2022-23, ₹ 7,124.63 crore pertaining to 866 outstanding UCs for the period upto 2021-22 were cleared.

#### (vii) Interest Adjustment:

Government is liable to pay/adjust interest in respect of balances under category J-Reserve Funds (a. Reserve Funds bearing interest) and K-Deposit and Advances (a. Deposits bearing interest), and for this purpose, specific Sub-Major Heads are provided in the List of Major and Minor Heads of Account.

Non-payment of the interest amounting to ₹ 1.33 crore has resulted in under statement of Revenue Expenditure.

## (viii) Guarantees given by the Government:

No Guarantee Act has been enacted by Haryana Government.

During the year 2022-23, total amount guaranteed by the State Government is ₹ 6,583.35 crore. The outstanding guarantees of ₹ 23,058.07 crore as on 1 April 2023, work out to 25.85 *per cent* of the State Revenue Receipts of the year 2022-23 (₹ 89,194.69 crore). However, no limits have been prescribed in this regard.

During 2022-23, the State Government received  $\stackrel{?}{\underset{?}{?}}$  48.31 crore towards guarantee fee, which constituted 0.73 *per cent* of the guaranteed amount during 2022-23 ( $\stackrel{?}{\underset{?}{?}}$  6,583.35 crore). Under the instructions regarding guarantees, the Government shall charge a minimum of one or two *per cent* of the guaranteed amount as guarantee fee which works out to  $\stackrel{?}{\underset{?}{?}}$  125.06 crore.

Further, no guarantee has been invoked during the year 2022-23.

The relevant figures are available in Statements 9, 14 and 20 of the Finance Accounts.

#### (ix) Expenditure on Ecology and Environment:

The expenditure incurred by the State Government towards environment is depicted in the Finance Accounts upto the level of Minor Head under various functional heads of accounts. During the year 2022-23, the Government of Haryana incurred an expenditure of ₹ 6.88 crore against the budget allocation of ₹ 6.44 crore (after incorporation of

Re-appropriation orders) under Major Heads 3435-Ecology and Environment.

During the previous year 2021-22, the Government of Haryana incurred ₹ 7.05 crore against the budget allocation of ₹ 7.05 crore (after incorporation of Re-appropriation orders) under Major Heads 3435-Ecology and Environment.

This has reference to Statements 15 of the Finance Accounts.

#### (x) Loans given by the State Government:

In respect of old loans [detailed accounts of which are not maintained by the Principal Accountant General (A&E)] amounting to ₹ 1,228.41 crore involving ten Departments, recoveries of principal have not been effected during the past several years and these loans are more than 10 years old.

Terms and conditions of repayment of loans have not been settled for loans amounting to ₹ 1,615.07 crore to Statutory Bodies/Other entities (details are in additional disclosures to Statement 18 of the Finance Accounts). Consequently, the receivables of the State Government on this account could not be estimated.

The Principal Accountant General (A&E) annually communicates loan balances (where detailed accounts are not maintained by the Principal Accountant General) to the loan sanctioning departments for verification and acceptance. None out of the 24 loanees have confirmed the balances. Details of information awaited from Departmental Officers for Reconciliation of Balances have been provided in Appendix VII of the Finance Accounts.

This has reference to Statements 7 & 18 of the Finance Accounts.

#### (xi) Committed Liabilities:

In terms of the Twelfth Finance Commission recommendations, action has been initiated by the Central Government to move towards accrual basis of accounting. However, as the transition would occur in stages, for a changeover to the accrual-based system of accounting, some additional information in the form of statement is required to be appended to the present system of cash accounting to ensure more transparency in decision-making. The State Government has to furnish information on Committed Liabilities, but it has been submitted by one department only (Social Justice, Empowerment, Welfare of Scheduled Castes and Backward Classes and Antyodaya Department) and the same has been reflected in Appendix XII of the Finance Accounts.

# (xii) Restructuring of Centrally Sponsored Schemes (CSSs)/Additional Central Assistance (ACA) excluding Block Grants:

Consequent to the merger of Plan/Non-Plan classification, the Central Assistance release is now classified as Central Assistance/Share under Centrally Sponsored Schemes.

The total expenditure booked under Centrally Sponsored Schemes, as on 31 March 2023, is ₹ 5,273.58 crore (Revenue Expenditure ₹ 4,606.41 crore and Capital Expenditure ₹ 667.17 crore), which includes expenditure out of Central Assistance and State share for Centrally Sponsored Schemes.

This has reference to Statements 15 and 16 of the Finance Accounts.

# (xiii) Direct transfer of Central Scheme Funds to Implementing Agencies in the State (Funds routed outside State Budget):

As per the PFMS portal of the CGA, ₹ 14,423.48 crore was directly received by the implementing agencies in the State during 2022-23, which included transfer to intermediaries/beneficiaries.

The direct transfer of fund to the implementing agencies has increased by 93.56 *per cent* as compared to 2021-22 (from ₹ 7,451.69 crore in 2021-22 to ₹ 14,423.48 crore) in 2022-23.

Details are in Appendix VI of the Finance Accounts.

#### (xiv) Off-Budget Liabilities of State Government:

The State Government did not disclose the off-budget liabilities in their annual budget in addition to the liabilities that have been depicted in the accounts, i.e., ₹23,058.07 crore as per Statements No. 9 and 20.

Off-Budget Borrowing is a liability of the Government in as much as the principal and the interest thereon invariably are serviced through the Government Budget, either as assistance or grant to the State entity. The Haryana Police Housing Corporation has raised loan of ₹ 22.05 crore during the year 2022-23 on the basis of guarantee given of ₹ 550.00 crore in the year 2015 by Government of Haryana whose interest and principal amount payment will be made through the State Budget.

#### (xv) Transfer of funds to Single Nodal Agency (SNA):

Ministry of Finance, Government of India vide letter No. 1(13)PFMS/FCD/2020 dated 23 March 2021 had notified the procedure for release of funds under Centrally Sponsored Scheme (CSS) and monitoring utilisation of the funds released through Single Nodal Agency (SNA). For each CSS, SNA is set up with own Bank Account in scheduled Commercial Bank authorised to conduct Government business by the State Government. As per the procedure, the State Government is to transfer the Central share received in its accounts to the concerned SNA's account alongwith corresponding State share.

As per SNA report of PFMS, the State Government received ₹ 2,737.87 crore being Central share during the year in its Treasury Accounts. The State Government transferred Central share of ₹ 3,018.71 crore received in Treasury Accounts and State share of ₹ 3,168.11 crore to SNAs. As on 31 March 2023, ₹ 2,378.76 crore was lying unspent in the bank accounts of SNAs.

However, the State Government intimated that it had received ₹ 3,034.10 crore being Central share during the year and transferred Central share of ₹ 3,034.10 crore, State share of ₹ 3,183.57 crore to the SNAs during the year. Out of total transfer of ₹ 6,217.67 crore, ₹ 425.42 crore was transferred through AC Bills, ₹ 4,847.48 crore through GIA bills and ₹ 944.77 crore through Fully Vouched Contingent Bills and other category of bills. Detailed vouchers and supporting documents of actual expenditure were not received by the office of Principal Accountant General (A&E) from the SNAs. The difference between the figures of SNA report of PFMS and as provided by the State Government needs reconciliation.

#### 4. Contingency Fund:

In exercise of the powers conferred by Section 3 of the Haryana Contingency Fund Act, 1966, the State Government made the Haryana Contingency Fund Rules, 1967 for regulating all matters connected with or ancillary to the custody of, payment of monies into, and the withdrawal of monies from, the Contingency Fund of the State of Haryana. The Contingency Fund of the State of Haryana has a corpus of ₹ 1,000.00 crore.

As on 31 March 2023, the Contingency Fund has a balance of ₹ 1,000.00 crore.

The relevant figures are available in Statements 1, 2, and 21 of the Finance Accounts.

#### 5. Public Account:

# (i) National Pension System (NPS):

During the year 2022-23, total contribution to the NPS which is a Defined Contribution Pension Scheme was ₹ 2,325.15 crore (Employees' contribution ₹ 1,004.06 crore and Government's contribution ₹ 1,321.09 crore). The detailed information on government contribution is available in Statement 15 of the Finance Accounts. The Government transferred ₹ 2,343.02 crore to the Public Account under Major Head 8342-117 Defined Contribution Pension Scheme. This includes an amount of ₹ 18.67 crore for the previous year leaving a balance of ₹ 0.80 crore at the end of the year 2022-23.

#### (ii) (A) Reserve Funds bearing Interest:

- (a) State Disaster Response Fund (SDRF): In terms of guidelines on constitution and administration of the State Disaster Response Fund (under Major Head- '8121 General and Other Reserve Funds' which is under interest bearing section), the Central and State Governments are required to contribute to the fund in the proportion of 75:25. During the year 2022-23, the State Government received ₹ 412.80 crore as Central Government's share. The State Government's share during the year is ₹ 137.60 crore. The State Government parked ₹ 900.00 crore (Central share ₹ 412.80 crore, State share ₹ 137.60 crore, Interest ₹ 297.78 crore and ₹ 51.82 crore lying unspent with departmental officers) to the Fund under Major Head 8121-122 SDRF.
- (b) State Disaster Mitigation Fund: The State Disaster Mitigation Fund (SDMF) is to be constituted under section 48 (1) (c) of the Disaster Management Act, 2005. This Fund is exclusively for the purpose of mitigation project in respect of disaster covered under State Disaster Response Fund (SDRF)/National Disaster Response Fund (NDRF) guidelines and the State specific local disasters notified by the State Government from time to time. The State Government has not created the SDMF as on 31 March 2023 under Major Head 8121-General and Other Reserve Funds, 130- State Disaster Mitigation Fund.

During the year 2022-23, the State Government received ₹ 149.80 crore from the Central Government. The State Government's share during the year is ₹ 49.93 crore. The State Government could not transfer any amount to the fund as the fund is yet to be created. As

such, ₹ 199.73 crore was not transferred and resulted in understatement of Revenue Expenditure.

(c) State Compensatory Afforestation Fund: In compliance with the instructions issued by the Ministry of Environment, Forest and Climate Change, Government of India, the State Governments are required to establish the State Compensatory Afforestation Fund under interest bearing section in Public Account of the State for amounts received from user agencies for undertaking Compensatory Afforestation.

During the year 2022-23, the State Government has neither received any amount (also nil in previous year) from the user agencies nor remitted any amount to the National Fund (nil in previous year). The Government also did not receive any amount from (nil in previous year) National Compensatory Afforestation Deposit. The total balance in the State Compensatory Afforestation Fund as on 31 March 2023 was ₹ 966.41 crore.

The State Government transferred ₹ 167.20 crore (interest ₹ 136.19 crore and balance from HDFC Bank ₹ 31.01 crore) to the Fund under Major Head-8121-129-State Compensatory Afforestation Fund in Public Account as on 31 March 2023.

#### **(B)** Reserve Funds not bearing Interest:

- (a) Consolidated Sinking Fund: The Government of Haryana set up the Consolidated Sinking Fund for amortization of loans in 2002. According to the guidelines of the Fund, States may contribute a minimum of 0.5 *per cent* of their outstanding liabilities (internal debt plus public account) as at the end of the previous year to the Consolidated Sinking Fund. In the year 2022-23, Government contributed only ₹ 300.00 crore as against ₹ 1,312.31 crore which it was required to contribute to the fund. The total accumulation of the Fund was ₹ 1,694.47 crore as on 31 March 2023 (₹ 1,286.08 crore as on 31 March 2022), which constitutes 0.65 *per cent of the outstanding liabilities* as at the end of the previous year. The short contribution of ₹ 1,012.31 crore to the Fund has resulted in understatement of Revenue Expenditure as given under para 6.
- **(b) Guarantee Redemption Fund:** The State Government constituted the Guarantee Redemption Fund to be administered by the RBI. The latest amendment to the Fund notification issued by the State Government, effective from the year 2020-21, stipulates that the State Government shall initially contribute a minimum of one *per cent* and thereafter at the rate of 0.5 *per cent* of outstanding guarantees at the end of the previous

year to achieve a minimum level of three *per cent* in the next five years. The Fund shall be gradually increased to the level of five *per cent*. The total accumulation of the Fund was ₹ 1,540.86 crore as on 31 March 2023 (₹ 1,428.51 crore as on 31 March 2022), which constitutes 6.68 *per cent* of total outstanding guarantees, which is above the target of 5 *per cent*.

Transactions in the Fund are depicted in Statements 21 and 22 of the Finance Accounts.

(c) Central Road and Infrastructure Fund (CRIF): The erstwhile Central Road Fund (CRF) has been renamed as the Central Road and Infrastructure Fund (CRIF) vide GoI's Gazette notification dated 31 March 2018. The CRIF will be used for development and maintenance of National Highways, Railway projects, improvement of safety in Railways, State and Rural roads and other infrastructure.

In terms of the extant accounting procedure, the grants received by the State from the Centre are to be initially booked as Revenue Receipts under Major Head 1601. Thereafter, the amount so received is to be transferred by the State Government to the Public Account under Major Head 8449-Other Deposits, 103-Subventions from Central Road and Infrastructure Fund through functional Major Heads(s).

During the year 2022-23, the State Government did not receive any grant under CRIF. However, closing balance as at 31 March 2023 under the Major Head 8449-Other Deposits-Subventions from Central Road and Infrastructure Fund is ₹ 185.60 crore.

#### (iii) Suspense and Remittance Balances:

The Finance Accounts reflect the net balances under Suspense and Remittance Heads. The outstanding balance under these heads, worked out by aggregating the outstanding debit and credit balances separately under various heads, was ₹ 796.15 crore (credit) under two Heads (8658 and 8782) as on 31 March 2023 [₹ 575.05 crore (credit) as on 31 March 2022].

Non-clearance of outstanding balances under these heads affects the accuracy of receipt/expenditure figures and balances under different heads of Accounts (which are carried forward from year to year) of the State Government.

#### (iv) Cheques and Bills:

Credit balance under MH 8670 Cheques and Bills indicates cheques issued but remaining un-encashed. The opening balance as on 01 April 2022 was ₹ 0.05 crore (Credit). During 2022-23, no cheques were issued, leaving a closing balance of ₹ 0.05 crore (Credit) as on 31 March 2023. The closing balance represents expenditure originally booked in various financial years under different functional Major Heads, which has not resulted in any cash outflow from the Government of Haryana till 31 March 2023.

# (v) Cash Balance:

The Cash balance as on 31 March 2023 as per the records of Principal Accountant General was ₹ 716.63 crore (Credit) and that reported by the RBI was ₹ 17.53 crore (Credit). There was a net difference of ₹ 734.16 crore (Credit), mainly due to incorrect reporting of transactions by Agency Banks to Reserve Bank of India. The difference is under reconciliation.

The relevant figures are available in Statement No. 21 of the Finance Accounts.

The Cash Balance as on 31 March last year as per records of Principal Accountant General was ₹ 371.24 crore (Credit) and that reported by the RBI was ₹ 107.79 crore (Debit). There was a net difference of ₹ 263.45 crore (Credit), mainly due to incorrect reporting of transactions by Agency Banks to Reserve Bank of India.

#### 6. Impact on revenue expenditure/revenue:

The impact on revenue expenditure of non-compliance to statutory provisions on the States' finances as brought out in the preceding paras is tabulated below:
